Mozart was short (no more than 5'4"), thin, and pale. His face was pockmarked from a childhood illness. He loved fine clothes good food, was generous and good-humored, according to contemporary accounts.

Mozart composed more than 625 works. The "Haffner" Symphony, No. 35, was completed in about two weeks. The "Linz" Symphony, No. 36, was finished in less than five days. Mozart wrote three numbers of *The Abduction from the Seraglio* in a single day. The entire violin part of the Sonata in G (K. 379) took all of one hour.

Mozart belonged to a Masonic lodge, and wrote some great music for it. His opera *The Magic Flute* was publicly performed, but it has Masonic philosophy woven into it.

In Concert Peter Fletcher, Classical Guitarist

Sunday, February 9, 2014



Award-winning New York classical guitarist, Peter Fletcher, will perform Sunday, February 9, 2014 at 3:00PM at the Peachtree Christian Church, 1580 Peachtree Street, NW, Atlanta, GA.

Peter Fletcher began guitar study at the age of seven under classical guitar instructor, John Sutherland. In 1980 classical guitarist José Tomás, Andrés Segovia's teaching assistant in Spain, held a week long Master Class in Atlanta, GA. Peter Fletcher was the youngest student to perform in the class, playing music by Bach and Carcassi. In December, 1983, he made his formal debut at the age of fifteen under the auspices of The Brasstown Concert Association in North Carolina. "He has technical facility but what one remembers about his playing is the nuances, the poetical phrasing, dynamic and tonal changes, his harmonics, and his cadences." wrote the critic of The Cherokee Scout.

Fletcher furthered his studies in Master Classes with David Leisner, David Russell, Oscar Ghiglia and Pepe Romero. As a performer in the Christopher Parkening Master Class in 1988, he was broadcast on National

Public Radio (NPR). In 1990, the Music Teacher's National Association (MTNA) awarded Fletcher a prize at its National Level Competition, and in 1995 he received the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music under Nicholas Goluses, and was twice the recipient of an Eastman Graduate Award.

In demand as a performer in cultural venues throughout the country, Mr. Fletcher has been invited to give recitals at the George Eastman House in Rochester, NY; Cincinnati's Memorial Hall; St. Philip Cathedral in Atlanta; Furman University in Greenville, South Carolina and many others. In 2003 he performed on the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert Series at the Chicago Cultural Center. In January 2005, Mr. Fletcher was invited to join the distinguished Jury of the 9th Annual Schadt String Competition in Allentown, Pennsylvania. He made his New York Debut at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in February 2007, and returned in 2008, 2009 and 2010 to a completely sold-out house.

Fletcher's three recordings, *The Art of Classical Guitar*, *A Peter Fletcher Recital*, and *Federico Mompou: Guitar Works*, have received critical acclaim. In September 2005 he released *Peter Fletcher Plays Erik Satie*, and his current release, *Peter Fletcher Plays Baroque Music for Guitar* was released in October 2008 on the Tower Hill Records label. His future recording project involves an all-Grieg album, for which he is writing the guitar transcriptions and is scheduled for release in Fall 2013.

Mozart Over Time – The Operas of Mozart Taken from "What We Hear in Music" by Anne Shaw Faulkner and Milton Cross' Complete Stories of the Great Operas. Edited by Ingrid Hanson for the Amadeus Newsletter.

Of Mozart's last three operas, "Così Fan Tute" and "Clemenza di Tito" were both in Italian, hurriedly written and do not show the strength of Mozart's genius. The former, written on commission from Emperor Franz Josef II, was first produced in Vienna, January 26, 1790, followed by "Clemenza di Tito" in 1791. Although the work was a comparative failure at its premiere, mainly due, it is said, to the weakness of the libretto, "Così Fan Tutte" nonetheless contains some of Mozart's most delightful music. Mozart wrote his last opera, "Die Zauberflöte" (The Magic Flute), when he was thirty-five years old, not long before his death. "Die Zauberflöte" is considered by many to be his finest opera. Written in German, the first performance was produced in 1791 in Vienna, September 30, 1791. In it, Mozart combined



simple German folk tunes and classic operatic writing with brilliant effect. The plot is a curious hodgepodge of political satire, the symbolism of Free Masonry and naïve humor set against an Egyptian background. Mozart never gave any greater example of his consummate dramatic gift than in the music written for "Die Zauberflöte" (The Magic Flute).


